



## Confession: The Way to Your Best Lent Yet

I don't like Lent. During this penitential season, it's painful to reflect on my life and the way I'm living it.

I think the people who enjoy Lent do so because they use it as a time of self-improvement. They read a book, attend a class, practice a new spiritual discipline, or go to church more often. Nothing wrong with that, but it's the easy part. The hard part of Lent is being honest — taking a good, healthy look at how you're living.

One of the best things we can do for ourselves and for others is to make an honest confession. Yes, Episcopalians make confessions! The Reconciliation of

a Penitent — on Page 447 of the Book of Common Prayer — offers two forms of sacramental confession with a priest. (I prefer the second one myself, but use the one that feels comfortable to you.)

"What happens in confession?" you ask. "What do I say? What do I do?" Here's how I recommend you prepare. Sit down somewhere quiet with a pad and pen. Ask God to help you identify your failings. Then start writing things down: things done and left undone . . . patterns of behavior that have been hurtful to you or others . . . bad decisions and careless actions at times when, perhaps, God was not a part of your life

. . . things others have done to you . . . the people who have done them. Think about the ways you protect yourself from others and the ways you make yourself feel good. With all of that you're ready to do a confession.

If you want a more help and structure, I recommend a wonderful little book called *Reconciliation: Preparing for Confession in the Episcopal Church*, by Martin L. Smith. (You can get it for less than the list price of \$10.95 at amazon.com, and it's also available in the Cathedral library.) It offers excellent

## Consecration of Our Bishop Coadjutor

The consecration of our bishop coadjutor-elect, the Rev. Dr. Dabney T. Smith, will be at 10 a.m. Saturday, March 10, at St. Jude's Catholic Cathedral in St. Petersburg.

The consecration service is open only to ticket-holders. Watch for information about a raffle to distribute the tickets the Cathedral has been assigned.

The service will be webcast on the diocesan web site ([www.dioceseswfla.org](http://www.dioceseswfla.org)) so you can watch on your computer at home. The service booklet will be posted online so you can print it out and follow along.

The Presiding Bishop, the Most Rev. Katharine Jefferts Schori, was already scheduled to consecrate the new bishop in Hawaii on March 10. In her place, the chief consecrator will be the Right Rev. Clifton Daniel of East Carolina.

Co-consecrators are the Right Rev. William Folwell (retired bishop of Central Florida, who ordained Father Smith to the priesthood); the Right Rev. Charles Jenkins, his bishop in Louisiana; and our diocesan bishop, the Right Rev. John B. Lipscomb. The preacher will be the Right Rev. Frank Gray, retired bishop of Northern Indiana.

guidance on the “why” of confession and an entire Chapter on how to prepare.

Now the big step! Call the office and ask to make an appointment with a priest. Any of us will be glad to meet with you. You and the priest will sit quietly together, face to face. We’ll pray together. Then you can dump all of that “stuff” in God’s lap and receive absolution. That means those burdens and sins are gone, wiped away. You don’t need to carry them around any longer. You may be amazed at how light and free you feel. Some people say they feel washed clean after confession.

Making a confession is a powerful spiritual exercise that will make your Lent really worthwhile. You can still read a book, attend a class, practice a new way of praying or go to church more often and make Lent even richer.

Let this be your best Lent ever.
