I love the idea of Lent. It is the execution of it that kills me!

Perhaps you have heard that saying before. It probably rings true to all of us. Here we are, well into this penitential season. How much longer, Lord? How much longer?

On Ash Wednesday I encouraged the congregation to remember that even amid the fasting of this season, there are feasts to be had. It is "fasting" when we remember those things done and left undone that grieve the heart of God. It is "feasting" when we remember that God did for us what we could not do for ourselves when Jesus, in complete obedience and submission to the will of God, hung on the cross and died for the sin of the world.

You don't have to die for your sin. Jesus already did that. What wondrous love is that? Be grateful and reflect on the following meditation, which I shared with you on Ash Wednesday. Keep your eye on the prize. We are getting closer to our Easter goal.

- Fast from judgment and feast on compassion.
- Fast from greed and feast on sharing.
- Fast from scarcity and feast on abundance.
- Fast from fear and feast on peace.
- Fast from lies and feast on truth.
- Fast from gossip and feast on praise.
- Fast from anxiety and feast on patience.
- Fast from evil and feast on kindness.
- Fast from apathy and feast on engagement.
- Fast from discontent and feast on gratitude.
- Fast from noise and feast on silence.
- Fast from discouragement and feast on hope.
- Fast from hatred and feast on love.

Hear Duruflé's *Requiem*, a Choral Masterpiece, March 14

The *Requiem* by Maurice Duruflé that will be presented March 14 at the Cathedral is a unique work that combines Gregorian chant themes, modern orchestration, and a tender, comforting treatment of the theme of death.



Duruflé (1902-1986; say "du-ROO-flay") composed the "Requiem" in 1947, in memory of his father. He drew on the work of Gabriel Fauré, whose own well-known *Requiem* toned down the gloomy, judgmental themes of the traditional requiem, or funeral rite, replacing them with an interpretation of death as "a departure from this troubled world and a hopeful arrival in a place of peace and eternal rest," musicologist Gary D. Cannon says.

Durufle's Requiem, March 14

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The work, sung in Latin, draws on flexible Gregorian rhythms, combined with 20th-century harmonics, and a unique, subtle "echo technique" in which one part of the choir follows a measure behind the rest of the singers.

Be sure you listen closely at the very end for one of the work's unusual musical features. The piece ends on what is known in music theory as a dominant-seventh chord, and your ear will tell you, "Don't stop there, take it one step further so it sounds finished." But the *Requiem* stops without that resolution. The text at this point is "eternal rest," and Durufle uses this "unfinished" device to convey the perpetual nature of our eternal rest.

"Durufle is considered one of the last great Impressionist composers," inspired by the Impressionist painters, says organist and choirmaster Dwight Thomas, who will conduct the work. "Durufle's compositional output is very small, because he was such a perfectionist, but what he did turn out is solid gold. His *Requiem* is considered his greatest composition and one of the masterpieces of 20th-century choral repertoire."

Durufle wrote four versions of the accompaniment for his *Requiem*: full orchestra; reduced, or chamber, orchestra, an acknowledgment that a full orchestra would be expensive for churches to afford and hard to accommodate in a church space; solo organ; and solo piano. We will present the chamber orchestra version, with orchestral and choral forces about the same as they were for our presentation of *Messiah* in December.

Requiems are often presented on occasions such as All Saints Day, but "the beginning of our Lenten observance with Ash Wednesday reminds us that we are but mortal, with the ashes a sign of both our mortality and penitence," Dwight said. "With that in mind, I think a presentation and meditation on these 'requiem' texts is especially fitting, and an aid and opportunity in helping to renew our repentance and faith during our Lenten journey."

Columbarium Will Include Archive of Architectural Treasures

When the city gave us permission to partially demolish the former Baptist Sanctuary to create a columbarium, one of the conditions was that we create an archive of historically and architecturally significant items.

The items in this picture will be arranged in a street-level archive room of the columbarium building, which we will create out of the remaining front section of the Baptist Sanctuary.

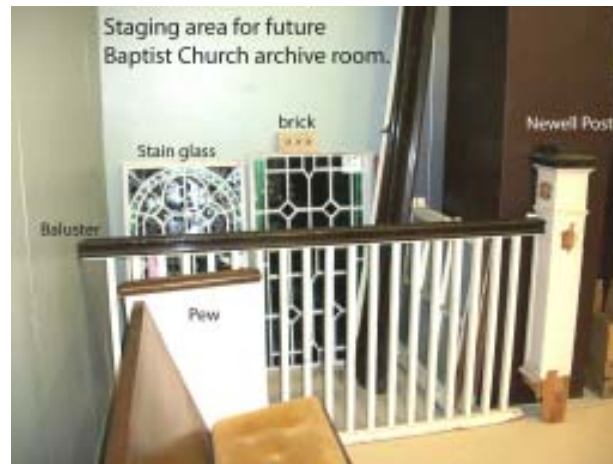
About 20,000 buff yellow bricks will be used in the garden wall that will surround the City Peace Garden, the outdoor columbarium that will be created where the back of the Baptist Sanctuary used to be.

Six thousand red clay bricks were also salvaged. Those are the memorial bricks that we are now selling, which can be etched with the name of the donor or a loved one. They will be used in the paths of the City Peace Garden.

Also seen here are the oak stair railing, baluster, and grand newel post with 6-inch base, cap, and box detail. One of the velvet-cushioned pews was salvaged. The

pew, without a kneeler, is three inches lower than standard pew seat height of 17 inches.

Also to be retained are samples of other materials used in the building, such as the oak flooring, fleur-de-lis clay tiles from the basement floor, the church sign and the granite cornerstone located on the northeast corner of the façade, placed there on December



20, 1923. Behind the cornerstone the Baptists placed a trove of items, including a New Testament, a membership roll of about 640 people, copies of sermons, recent newspapers, and pictures.

We're a landmark!

A brass marker outside our new narthex makes it official: The city awarded St. Peter's historic landmark status in December. The marker, given by St. Petersburg Preservation with a grant from the city, documents our historic significance in the life of St. Petersburg. The Cathedral was built in 1899. The Baptist Sanctuary and the Princess Martha Hotel, which share our block, also have landmark status.

Getting Ready to Occupy Our Great New Space

On recent Sundays, you may have sniffed the aroma of paint from our new building. If you drove past the Cathedral during the week, you may have seen the plumbing contractor's truck as he worked to install the new restrooms.

Moving day will soon be upon us.

Early this month we expect to start occupying our new space in part of the first floor. Watch for announcements online and in the worship bulletin for the exact dates and moving plans. Look for signs directing you to classes and other events.

Here's what you can expect to see:

- * Coffee hour on Sundays will return to the glassed-in narthex.

- * We are creating temporary office space for the staff. For the immediate future, Dean Morris will share an office with choirmaster Dwight Thomas. A second office will be shared by administrator Martha Goodwill, bookkeeper Nancy Titus, and publications associate Judy Evans.

- * Indoor restrooms, at long last.

- * We will have two spaces available for all our meetings, classes, gatherings, meals, and other activities: the narthex, and the space we've been using for coffee hour, overlooking Fourth Street and Williams Park. Ministry leaders should check with Martha to determine in which of these areas their groups will meet.



"These are both large spaces, and it may be that some small groups will not be comfortable in them, but they are what we have right now," Martha said. "If your group wants a more intimate space, you may want to consider other options, such as meeting in homes, or in the community room at Panera Bread, until we have finished out the rest of the first floor and have other spaces to offer."

The limited space means it is more important than ever that groups put their events on the calendar well in advance.

Ministry leaders should check with Martha about obtaining keys, learning how to code in and out, and understanding the security provisions in the new building.

We are still figuring out exactly where some things will go, what sort of kitchen facilities we will have, and where we will store the materials we are bringing over from St. Peter's Central. Some of these decisions may not be made until we actually get into the building, see how things fit, and determine what we need and what we don't.

If your ministry has not yet weeded through its belongings at St. Peter's Central and packed them for moving, this would be a good time to do that.

If you have personal items at St. Peter's Central — cookie platters, a favorite mug in the kitchen, or other items — please take them home now. Things tend to get damaged or lost in moves, no matter how careful we are.

We are finishing out only part of the first floor right now. The kitchen and parish hall will be completed later, as money allows, as will the space where we've been holding coffee hour while the glass narthex was off-limits because of construction. That area is scheduled to become the bishop's chapel, flower room, and vesting area.

Eventually, there will be additional multi-purpose meeting/classroom space on the first floor, and a nursery. Staff offices and the music suite will be on the second floor.
