Our Anniversary Celebration Invites You to 'Give 50'


On Sunday, November 17, we will observe our Golden Anniversary as a Cathedral and our 130th year as a worshiping community.

It was on November 18, 1969, that St. Peter's was officially designated the Cathedral for the newly-created Diocese of Southwest Florida, and it was in 1889 that a tiny mission chapel was renamed St. Peter's Episcopal Church.

Our traditional Thanks-a-Brunch that day, celebrating a successful pledge drive, will also be our anniversary party.

Here's how you can help commemorate our 50th anniversary: GIVE 50.

No, not \$50 (though we're always happy to accept financial gifts). We're inviting you to give 50 minutes of intentional volunteer service during October or November, one minute per year of our life as a Cathedral. You can give 50 minutes all at once, or break those minutes up into smaller chunks.

If You Pay by Automatic Deduction, Please Update Your Account

Do you pay your pledge by having funds automatically deducted from your checking account or charged to your credit card?

If so, be aware that your withdrawal may be set to end on December 31, 2019. (When you created your account you established an end date, which for many people is the end of the calendar year.)

If you want us to continue to make those automatic withdrawals, you need to establish a new account with a new end date. You can do this by logging into our website, spcathedral.org, then click on the red "give" box, and fill in the prompts to set up a new withdrawal plan. This is also necessary as you increase your pledge for 2020.

You cannot simply change the date or amount on your current

account. This is for your protection, so no unauthorized person can change the terms of your withdrawals.

You can do this now; no need to wait until the end of the year. We can't continue to withdraw money from your account or credit card after December 31 unless you set up a new account allowing us to do so.

Pledge Campaign Invites Your Acknowledgment of God's Generosity

Our fall pledge campaign begins on October 4 with Oktoberfest, an evening of great food, fellowship, and music.

On Monday, October 7, pledge cards will be in the mail, inviting you to make a financial commitment to the Cathedral for 2020.

"Our pledge goal is \$810,000, an increase of about \$50,000 over the current year," Dean Morris says in an accompanying letter. "Each of us needs to give serious, prayerful thought to how much St. Peter's means to us and commit to a pledge that makes that thought a reality."

Throughout the fall you'll hear sermons and testimonials about the importance of

pledging. Our target goal again this year is a 6.5 percent increase over 2019.

The pledge season culminates Novem-

ber 2-3, our ingathering weekend, when you are invited to turn in your pledge card if you haven't done so already.

If you don't receive a pledge card, or if you lose it, please call the church (727-822-4173) and we'll be happy to send you one. Or pick one up at the front desk.

Then on Sunday, November 17, we'll celebrate our good fortune and your generosity with our annual complimentary "Thanks a Brunch" after the 10:15 a.m. service. At the same time we

will celebrate our Golden Anniversary as a Cathedral and our 130th year as a worshiping community.

This is always a fun event, with great food (catered by A Fresh Connection), and this year a display of historical items, a PowerPoint presentation on our history and a sense of how blessed we are by our Cathedral family, our leadership, and the gifts that previous generations have given us: our beautiful Cathedral, its contents, and its traditions.

Stewardship is a 24/7, year-round process. Stewardship refers to our acknowledgment that all that we are and all we have comes from God and that we are entrusted with giving a portion of our time, talent, and treasure back to God. We ask you to think about what the Cathedral means to you and be as generous as God has been to you in making your pledge.



Book Talk Will Explore All-American Food Brought to Us by Immigrants

What's on our plate often reflects what's in the headlines or what's in our history.

That's the idea that food journalist and podcaster Janet K. Keeler will explore when she opens our ninth season of book talks

at noon Tuesday, October 8, reviewing *The Immigrant Cook-book: Recipes That Make Amer-ica Great* by Leyla Moushabeck.

Where would we be without those all-American favorites

— Jewish pastrami on rye, pizza, pad thai, hummus, sushi, jambalaya, Cuban sandwiches, even hot dogs — all of which were brought to us by immigrants?

Foods brought from around the world transformed the way America eats and reflect culture, race, history, politics, civil rights, and economics. Drive down any "restaurant row" and the storefronts will tell you who the immigrant groups are that

shape that community, when they came there, and how the foods of their homeland have become mainstream American fare.

Turn to the cookbooks of the past for a lesson in history: victory-garden and ra-

tion-book cookbooks during World War II; Julia Child's *Mastering the Art of French Cooking* from 1961, when the Kennedys presided over Camelot and all things French held center stage; the vegetarian *Moosewood Cookbook* from the back-to-the-land days of the 1970s.

Janet K. Keeler is a journalism instructor and coordinator of the

Graduate Food Writing and Photography Certificate Program at the University of South Florida St. Petersburg. She is a 35year daily newspaper veteran, with 15 years as food editor at the *Tampa Bay Times*. She is the cookbook commentator for *The Zes*t podcast on WUSF-Public Media and a freelance writer for *Visit Florida*, the state's tourism website. She leads students on culinary tours of Europe as she pursues a doctorate in education program development at USF.

'Mount St. Alban's Service' Will Highlight Choral Evensong in October

At our service of Choral Evensong at 5 p.m. Sunday, October 27, the Cathedral Chamber Choir will sing the "Mount St. Alban's Service" by David



David Hogan

Hogan, an American composer who was killed in July 1986 in the explosion of TWA Flight 800 from New York to Paris.

The service was commissioned for the celebration of completion and consecration of Washington National Cathedral, where Hogan had been a chorister in the late 1970s. Listen to the "Magnificat" here: youtube.com/watch?v=VqxOp061Y5A

At the time of his death at the age of 47, Hogan was tenor soloist at the American Cathedral in Paris and was working on film scores in French.

Hogan was a co-founder of The Walden School, a summer school and festival in Dublin, NH, dedicated to the training of young musicians and composers.

A statement mourning "the loss of a great mu-

sician and dear friend" said, "Mr. Hogan held the conviction that fostering creativity is the primary purpose of education, and that the most successful program for musical training is one through which students discover new materials and concepts for themselves and learn to think independently. Many of his former students have become professional composers and performers."

The service includes the Responses of Gabriel Jackson and Halley's anthem, "Bring us, O Lord God."

An organ prelude is at 4:45 p.m. Dwight Thomas is music director and organist.

Compline is traditionally the last service of the day, a moment of reflection between day and dark. It offers calm and repose, a time to wind down from one busy week and prepare for the week to come. The service lasts about half an hour.

We offer Compline on the second Sunday of

the month, September through March (no service in December).

children gathered around the altar, some just tall enough to peek over the top; a child serving as deacon as the priest prepares the elements; a younger child holding the chalice as her friends come forward for communion. As we go through the liturgy,

some voices are louder and more confident because the children are familiar with the words. Others may be hearing them for the first time. Being so close to the action, the kids are drawn in and get to see and experience Eucharist differently than they do from the pews.

Building on what they have learned in Children's Eucharist, for six weeks we will

take children and middlers (ages 4 through 11) through an instructed Eucharist course. Five weeks of lessons and activities will culminate in a special recognition during the 10:15 a.m. service on Sunday, November 10.

Each week's lesson builds on the last as we work our way through the full worship liturgy and the children create their own liturgy cards and Eucharist kit. There are so many demands on our schedules, but if you can commit to these six weeks, it promises to be a formative time.

Here's the outline for the classes: October 6: We Gather to Worship; October 13: We Hear the Word of God and Respond; October 20: We Celebrate; October 27: Going Forth; November 3: Children's Eucharist

(the kids will make their communion bread!); November 10: special recognition during the 10:15 service.

Families are always invited and encouraged to join us. You might just learn something new too!





Tough-Talking Dame Fights the Klan In Book Club's October Selection

This month's selection for the St. Peter's Book Club is *The Paragon Hotel* by Lyndsay Faye, and it sounds right out of Mickey Spillane and Dashiel Hammett:

The year is 1921, and "Nobody" Alice James has just arrived in Oregon with a bullet wound, a lifetime's experience battling the New York Mafia, and \$50,000 in illicit cash. A Pullman porter leads her to the Paragon Hotel, an all-black hotel in a Jim Crow city whose lodgers seem terrified to have a white woman on the premises.

Well they might: The Ku Klux Klan has arrived in Portland in fearsome numbers — burning crosses, electing officials, infiltrating newspapers, and brutalizing blacks. And only Alice and her new Paragon family are searching for a missing mulatto child who has mysteriously vanished into the woods.

Google Books calls The Paragon Hotel "a masterpiece of historical suspense" that plumbs the nation's dark past and the most redemptive facets of humanity. Roberta Poellein is the presenter.

We'll shuffle under the stars at the historic St. Petersburg Shuffleboard Club.






Welcome to Coffee With the Clergy

Virginia Seminary Creates Slavery Reparations Fund

Virginia Theological Seminary has announced that it has set aside \$1.7-million for a slavery reparations fund.

Enslaved African-Americans worked on the Alexandria, VA, campus of the seminary, which was founded in 1823, and at least one building, Aspinwall Hall in 1841, was built with slave labor. Black students were excluded from attending the Episcopal seminary until the 1950s.

"As we seek to mark [the] seminary's milestone of 200 years, we do so conscious that our past is a mixture of sin as well as grace," VTS Dean Ian Markham said in a news release. "This is the seminary recognizing that along with repentance for past sins, there is also a need for action."

The seminary specified five ways the income from the fund might be spent:

- * On needs identified by local congregations with ties to VTS;
 - * On the needs of descendants of en-

slaved people who worked at VTS;

- * To support the work of black alumni, especially at historically black congregations:
- * To raise up African-American clergy; and
 - * Other activities that promote justice

and inclusion.

The seminary expects to be able to spend about \$70,000 a year from endowment income. Its first steps will be to try to identify descendants of slaves who were forced to work at VTS and to reach out to the local community.


the opening worship on Friday afternoon.
