If you give online via the Realm app, you can check your balance yourself. Log into your Realm account and select Giving.

Checks should be received at the Cathedral by December 20 to be considered tax-deductible for 2021. If you are paying online you have until December 31.

If you pay via automatic deduction from your checking account or credit card, please remember to update these accounts before the end of the year. Many of these accounts automatically expire on December 31 and you must reset them with a new expiration date, i.e., December 31, 2022.

To do so, just log into your Realm account, select Giving (left side bar) and then +Give where you can create a new account. Or you can edit/change your gift by clicking on the three dots ... and select Edit.

If you would like assistance in editing or setting up a new online giving account, Ray and Michelle are ready to help you.

# Service of the Longest Night Offers Peace and Light in a Dark Time

At 7 p.m. Tuesday, December 21, we will offer our second annual Longest Night Service, both live in the Cathedral and online. This is a service of prayer and mindfulness for those dealing with loss of all kinds. Canon Ethan Cole will be the officiant.

We traditionally think of the holiday season as a time of joy and abundance, but for some the pressure to celebrate can be overwhelming. Life situations and loss can heighten feelings of worry and grief. In this second year of the pandemic we are all grieving loss of one kind or another and carrying burdens of anxiety and fear. This is a service of light in the midst of darkness.

The service is scheduled for the Winter Solstice, the longest night of the year.

We recognize that there is darkness in all our lives. Through music, silent meditation, scripture, and healing prayer, we reach out to acknowledge sadness with comfort and quiet remembrance, to reflect on the losses we have experienced and to remember together

the real reason for the season: The Light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it. God is with us.

Our guest musician will be classical guitarist John Barr, and choir member David Smith will sing.

Whether you are having a difficult time this holiday season or just want a moment of quiet, please come. If you know someone who is sad, struggling, or alone, please invite them to attend. Everyone is welcome.

# Cathedral Will Close in January For Termite Fumigation

The Cathedral will be closed January 6 through 10 while the worship space is fumigated for drywood termites.

All services and activities on the premises — including Sunday worship — will be canceled during that time.

You won't see the Cathedral draped in brightcolored circus-like canvas. The exterminators, Turner Pest Control, will use a procedure called "taped and sealed," which is safe and effective without a big tent.

All doors will be locked and chained and no one will be able to gain access during the fumigating. This includes the worship space, the Narthex, offices, Harvard Hall, the choir room, the nursery, the flower room, the youth room, and the Children's Chapel. It also includes the tenants on the second and third floors of the office building.

Cathedral staff and volunteers will be hard at work as soon as we reopen the first week of January after the Christmas break to clear out and prepare the premises for fumigation. All consumable items (food, drinks, candy, first-aid medications, communion wafers, and more) will be removed.

Nursery cribs will be removed; all plants must go; gas and HVAC systems must be turned off; every door, cabinet, and drawer must be left open. There are many other requirements on the list prior to fumigation. After fumigation, everything must be put back, turned on, and cleaned up.

We'll have more details at the beginning of January. Watch for an announcement about an outdoor worship opportunity for Sunday, January 9 as well as a pre-recorded service for online viewing. Children's Chapel is cancelled. EYSeedlings and EYC will meet off-site for fun and fellowship. Chanted Compline for January 10 will be live-streamed only (and don't be alarmed – Thomas and Michelle pre-recorded it in the Cathedral!).

# Book Club Will Follow Adventures of War Correspondent



tor of spirituality and health.


I've served in other congregations as a Faith Community Nurse for 11 years. I am a graduate of the University of Florida College of Nursing. In 2011

# A Trip to Rome Leads Dean Morris to a Role In Promoting Anglican-Roman Catholic Unity



It was the fall of 2018 when Dean Stephen Morris and his wife, Christina, were

invited on a pilgrimage sponsored by the Anglican Centre in Rome: Come to Italy, visit the Centre, learn what we're all about and the role we play in promoting unity between the Roman Catholic and Anglican Churches.

When Pope Francis made his regular appearance on the steps of the Vatican to greet the faithful, the Morrises and the rest of their pilgrimage party were seated in the front row. With expert guides they toured churches and

historic sites off the beaten path that tourists never see. There were lectures and

conversations and meals where friendships were kindled. "It was transformational for both of us," the dean recalled. "It really stretched me."

Now Dean Morris is vice chair of the American Friends of the Anglican Centre, in line to become the chair next year and to be appointed by the Presiding Bishop to a seat on the Centre's board of governors.

The Centre was founded in 1966, at a time "when ecumenism was all the rage," Dean Morris said. Its threefold mission

is hospitality, education, and diplomacy, developing a new relationship of friendship and deeper understanding between the Anglican Communion and the Roman Catholic Church.

The executive director of the Centre is Archbishop Ian Ernest, formerly Bishop of Mauritius and Primate of the Anglican Church of the Indian Ocean. He is the Archbishop of Canterbury's personal liaison to the Vatican.

At the Centre's founding, in one powerful gesture, Pope Paul VI placed his Episcopal ring on the finger of then-Archbishop of Canterbury Michael Ramsey. The ring is one of the two most significant symbols of the episcopate (the other is the crosier, or shepherd's crook, symbolizing the bishop's role as pastor of the flock). At the Centre's 50th anniversary Evensong in 2016, Pope

Francis gave Archbishop Justin Welby his crosier.

The work of the Centre is more than symbolic. Roman Catholics and Anglicans have joined to fight slavery and human trafficking and to promote relief for immigrants and asylum seekers. Another result: It is now permissible for Anglican/Episcopal and Roman Catholic clergy to co-preside at the wedding of an Anglican/Episcopalian and a Roman Catholic.

In addition, the Centre has long provided pilgrimage tours like the one the Morrises took, classes and webinars, sabbatical support, and worship and social opportunities for visitors.

What the Centre does not have is a sustainable basis of support, hence the founding of "Friends of the Anglican Center" groups in this country and in Europe. "Our goal is to raise 200,000 Euros (about \$232,000) to provide financial stability," the dean said. If you would like to help make that hope a reality, please speak to Dean Morris. "It is my hope and prayer that reaching the sustainability goal, financially, will enable the pilgrimages to resume and the full life of the Centre to fully bloom once again," Dean Morris said. "The Centre is a very special place in the Eternal City."

### **Bishop Search Committee Is Interviewing Candidates**

#### The Rev. Canon Dr. Thomas Williams

As a member of the Bishop Coadjutor Search Committee, I have the enjoyable task of providing an update on the search process.

The final deadline for applications was

October 5. The files were first reviewed in a redacted form so that the committee could review the candidates' answers "without regard to gender, race, familial and/or marital status, sexual orientation, gender identity, age, or any other identifying characteristic"

(that's language from the search website, which you can find at <u>bishopsearchswfl.org</u>). Only after rating their essays did we learn

the candidates' names, current calls, and so forth.

We are now in the process of interviewing candidates, and although the committee's deliberations are strictly confidential,

I can say that we are firmly on schedule. Interviews will continue through January 2022, and then the committee will submit a list of finalists to the Standing Committee.

In the spring of 2022 the finalists will come to the diocese for

"walkabouts," which are opportunities for delegates (and others) to get acquainted with the finalists. The election will be held at the Cathedral on April 2, 2022; pending the canonically required approvals, the new bishop will be consecrated on September 24, 2022.

We are electing a bishop coadjutor, who has the right of succession. He or she will serve alongside Bishop Smith for some period of time, and will become the diocesan bishop automatically when Bishop Smith retires. Bishop Smith has not set a retirement date, saying that the timing of his retirement will depend on his health and stamina as well as the diocesan budget.

Please keep the search committee, the candidates, and the electors in your prayers:

Almighty God, giver of every good gift: Look graciously on your Church, and so guide the minds of those who shall choose a bishop for this Diocese, that we may receive a faithful pastor, who will care for your people and equip us for our ministries; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

### **Outreach Year-End Summary:**

How We Spent Our Time, Talent, and Treasure

The Outreach Committee is ending 2021 as we began it by considering how we can be good stewards of the treasure, time, and talent with which you, the congregation, have entrusted us to further the Kingdom of God.

The Cathedral has given us this mission:

Because we are compelled by Christ to be the healing presence of God's love in the world, we work to transform the lives of the vulnerable through food, health, education, relationship-building, and inclusivity initiatives.

In terms of treasure, we have been allocated about \$32,000, which we distribute to partner nonprofit agencies, and have been blessed with a congregation that very generously supplies food, personal-hygiene items, diapers (for adults and children), school supplies, and so forth, through monthly collections.

The nonprofit agencies the Cathedral supported financially in 2021 include Campbell Park Elementary School, Florida Resurrection House, Peterborough Apartments, Daystar, St. Petersburg Free Clinic, Babycycle, Diapers for Dignity of the Area Agency on Aging of Pasco-Pinellas Inc., Guardian ad Litem, and Ready for Life for children aging out of foster care.
