us that day. Campbell Park, one of our community partners, is the recipient of backpacks and school supplies contributed by the congregation.



A New Leader, New Plans for the Cathedral Library

Charles assumed the role at Dean Morris's request after the death of longtime library leader Marian McGrath.

"I want the library to be a place people will use, not just books on shelves — where

they'll find enjoyable fiction and nonfiction, recent books as well as classics," Charles said. "We are a congregation full of people who love to read — look at our St. Peter's Book Club and our book talks. I want to encourage everyone to come in, look us over, and become aware of what's here. It's not just reference books or old Bibles.

"I also want the library to be a place where people come and browse and find

inspiration, even deepen their faith by reading meditations and commentaries" on the Bible, he said.

Canon Ethan Cole will lead another of his popular online Bible


studies this month — on the Book of Jonah.

"Jonah is called by God to preach repentance to Israel's ancient enemy, and he famously flees his vocation, reluctant to let God be merciful to the Ninevites.

"We will look at some of the literary and historical is-

sues, but we will focus on what is the message of Jonah for us as Christians, and how can we live and proclaim a Gospel word of mercy," he said.





This Episcopal Church-wide order represents Christian women who adopt a Rule of Life based on the promises of our Baptismal Covenant (see Page 304 of the Book of Common Prayer).

You can recognize a Daughter by the cross she wears. It bears the inscription *Magnanimiter crucem sustine*, which means "With heart, mind, and spirit, uphold and bear the cross" and the initials FHS, which stand for "For His Sake."

A Tale of Two Giraffes' Epic Journey: August Book Club Selection Roberta Poellein

West with Giraffes by Lynda Rutledge is a rousing tale based on the true story of how a pair of giraffes (yes, really!) survived a hurricane while crossing the Atlantic. It's the August selection for the St. Peter's Book Club, and Shar Nudelman

is the presenter.

The novel is set in 1938, when war was looming in Europe, the Great Depression lingered, and Americans were desperate for something to raise their spirits. They found it in the story of the giraffes' perilous transatlantic journey, followed by a 12-day road trip from the East Coast to the San Diego Zoo. At the wheel is the narrator, Dust Bowl rowdy Woodrow Wilson Nickel.

"Part adventure, part historical saga, and part coming-of-age love story, *West with Giraffes* explores what it means to be changed by the grace of animals, the kindness of strangers, the passing of time, and a story told before it's too late," amazon.com says.

The book club meets at 6:30 p.m. Tuesday, August 24. All are welcome! No need to have read the book; our lively discussion may inspire you to do so.

The diocesan Race and Reconciliation Committee invites everyone to participate in a diocese-wide read in August and Sep-

tember of The Color of Compromise: The Truth About the American Church's Complicity in Racism by Jemar Tisby.

There will be two Zoom sessions, at 7 p.m. August 23 and October 4. The first is an opening discussion with video clips. During the next few weeks, read the book, and join the second Zoom gathering to discuss the book

and talk about concrete solutions to end racist practices and create a more inclusive church. Find details at <a href="mailto:specifications-right-specifica

The Color of Compromise "details how the American church" — all denominations, not just the Episcopal Church — "has

helped create and maintain racist ideas and practices," <u>amazon.com</u> says.

The book offers a historical, sociological, and religious journey from colonial times through slavery and the Civil War, the Jim Crow years, the Civil Rights era, and the Black Lives Matter movement.

Many denominations — including the Methodists, Presbyterians, and Baptists — split before the Civil War over slavery. Southern Episcopal dioceses joined the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Confederate States

of America during the war, but were welcomed back after it ended. Leonidas Polk, Bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Louisiana, was a slaveholder and a major general

in the Confederate Army.

"The goal of this book is not guilt," writes the author, who is CEO of The Witness Inc., an organization dedicated to Black uplift. "The purpose of tracing Christian complicity with racism is not to show white believers how bad they are. It is simply a fact of American history that white leaders and laity made decisions to maintain the racist status quo." Now, he says, "it is up to Christians who comprise the church to end compromise with racism within the church."

Our guests are housed at participating churches as they seek jobs, social services, and permanent housing. We are part of a national nonprofit that serves homeless families.

Four times a year, the Cathedral supports a host church, Palm Lake Christian, by providing a dinner and a lunch for our guests. We're now looking for a team of

Cathedral volunteers who will get together once a quarter to prepare the food and
