

## On April 2, We Elect a New Bishop

And now: the election.

On Saturday, April 2, the Diocese of Southwest Florida will elect a bishop coadjutor who will succeed the Right Rev. Dabney Smith as the sixth bishop of our diocese.

It's an exciting day, a day that will determine the direction of this diocese for the next decade or more. Here's how you can be involved.

The Cathedral is hosting the electing convention, which is open only to registered delegates. If you are not a voting delegate or have not been assigned a specific volunteer role that day, you will not be admitted

to the Cathedral. You can watch the proceedings on the diocesan website (<u>episcopalswfl.org</u>) or on its Facebook page.

The Cathedral's voting delegates are our clergy and three lay delegates, members of the Chapter: Tessa Burnsed, Lauren Durst, and Jennifer Preston, and alternate Susan Darrow.

A worship service begins at 10 a.m. and the electing convention

will begin shortly after the end of the worship, some time after 11 a.m.

Clergy and lay delegates vote separately. To achieve election, a candidate must receive 50 percent plus one of the votes in both the lay order and the clergy order on the same ballot. There is no way to

### Our Confirmands Learned to Ask the Questions, Keep Seeking the Answers

Last summer, when I asked one of our 8th-graders if they were planning to join the fall confirmation class, they replied, "I don't think so. I have too many questions."



"Perfect!" I said. "Sounds like you're exactly ready for confirmation."

And so they are. At the Great Vigil of Easter — 7 p.m. Saturday, April 16 — five

wonderful young people will undergo the rite of confirmation. The Book of Common Prayer describes confirmation as "a mature public affirmation of their faith and commitment to the responsibilities of their baptism." Carter Curtis, Ellie Curtis, Dustin Knight, Sophia Preston, and Joseph Shideler are ready.

The focus throughout the confir-

mation process was empowering youth to discern what they believed — not a belief that was passed down, not just what their family believes, or what friends might believe. Our hope is that when they stand in front of the congregation and affirm their faith, it's a faith that is true to them.

Our confirmation process, based loosely on the "Confirm not Conform" curriculum, started each week by posing a set of statements. On the wall we taped signs that read: strongly agree, agree, neutral, disagree, strongly disagree. We all moved to where we were after each statement was read. They ranged from "I prefer speaking to listening" to "I sometimes feel God's presence" or "I have people who can help me." The point is that we found ourselves in different places, and that's okay. There

will be aspects of our faith where we align with family, friends, and community, and sometimes our beliefs may fall in a different spot on the spectrum. It is challenging but it makes for a more vibrant faith when we are able to discern what we believe versus what others may believe.

Michelle Thomas, our associate for Christian formation, and I led the youth through a 16-session confirmation series, including two retreat days and four sessions with mentors over the course of seven months. We met weekly, knowing that building community and talking through challenging topics with peers are an important aspect of formation. We covered the Lord's Prayer, the Bible, the Nicene Creed, the Book of Common Prayer, the sacraments, church history, and more.

We emphasized that the intent of each session was not to make sure they "knew" everything there was to know about each topic (obviously not possible in an hour!), but to expose them to some of the pillars of our faith. They rose to the occasion and

engaged in thoughtful theological conversation.

This is the continuation of a relationship with God that began at their baptisms with promises made on their behalf. Now they're ready to make that mature public affirmation of their faith. We are delighted to continue this journey with them as their faith expands and grows. And we hope they keep asking really great questions.



#### What Their Mentors Said

"Mentor" feels like the wrong word for my role in Ellie Curtis and Sophia Preston's confirmation journey. Something like "witness" or "ally" would be more accurate. I witnessed two young women ask and grapple with some of life's most difficult questions. For example: Who do I want to become? Where do I see God in my life? What do I do if I disagree with some of our traditions? And I had the pleasure of trying to be an ally to them, affirming their smart questions and listening to their unique experiences. I learned that, despite our age

gap, we're not so different after all, because we're all just trying to figure it out as we go along.

### Raising Kids in the Digital Age: Book Group for Parents



### Learn About Our Neighbors at Peterborough on April 24

At our 9 a.m. formation hour on Sunday, April 24, we'll provide an introduction to the Peterborough Apartments, one of our ministry partners.

St. Peter's was deeply involved in the creation of Peterborough, a 150-unit apartment building offering affordable housing

to seniors. A number of our parishioners serve on the board. Peterborough, at 440 Fourth Ave. N, opened in 1981 and was completely renovated in 2015.

Our involvement with the residents has been limited in the last two years because of Covid, but we regularly provide goodie bags and emergency kits. On April 24 we'll talk about ways that you can be involved.

Since Peterborough offers affordable housing, we'll also spend

some time talking about the housing crisis in St. Petersburg and actions being taken to address the situation.

### **Latin Rhythms Will Enliven Final Evensong of the Season**

Our last service of Choral Evensong for this season, at 5 p.m. April 24, the Second Sunday of Easter, will offer the Service in C. known as the "Latin American" service, of the British composer Bryan Kelly (b. 1934).

After an organ prelude at 4:45 p.m., the service begins with Hymn 212, "Awake, arise, lift up your voice." The Responses are

by Thomas Foster and the Anthem is Harold Friedell's "Come, My Way, My Truth, My Life." The concluding hymn is 457, "Thou art the Way, to thee alone."

Kelly's service incorporates Latin American rhythms with the familiar words of the Magnificat and the Nunc dimittis. Listen to the service here as sung by the Guildford Cathedral Choir: https://www.youtube.com/ watch?v=N3iz Lz8YEI

Bryan Kelly Kelly's compositions range from light orchestral music and works for brass band to more serious and extended orchestral works as well as church music.

Please remember these continuing musical offerings:

- \* Chanted Compline at 7 p.m. Sunday, April 10 last of the season. Attend in person or via livestream (http://spcathedral. org/worship-live-stream): Offered by the Rev. Canon Dr. Thomas Williams and singer Michelle Thomas. The word "compline" is derived from the Latin completorium, since the service is to be said at the completion of the day. This service is relatively short - only about 20 minutes (See Page 127 of the Book of Common Prayer) – and includes the confession, psalms, scripture readings, the Lord's Prayer, and the Nunc dimittis ("Lord, now let your servant go in peace").
- \* Our podcast of sung noonday prayer continues. Canon Williams and Michelle Thomas sing the Order of Service for Noonday each Monday through Saturday. The podcasts are posted on Spotify and Apple Podcast each day at 9 a.m. The service lasts between eight and nine minutes, with the sung service lasting six minutes and a spoken meditation two or three minutes.

## New Microgrants Program Supports The Work of Local Nonprofits

One of the primary responsibilities of the Outreach Committee is to allocate the money entrusted to us by the Cathedral to various nonprofit organizations helping the needlest among us.

In 2022, as in 2021, we have been given \$32,000 to distribute. This report, the second in a series, focuses on our new Microgrant Program, which funds projects through a competitive grant system open to all nonprofits. It has been designed to encourage connections between the Cathedral and organizations that work to transform the lives of the vulnerable through food, health, education, relationship building, and inclusivity initiatives.

We have allocated \$2,500 from our annual allotment for the first cycle of grants, which are expected to range between \$200 and \$750.

The application will be posted on the Cathedral website and applications will be accepted between May 1 and June 15. Awards will be made in early August.

Coming up next month in this series of reports: Continuing donations to community organizations. The last of these reports will discuss the 2022 allocations to nonprofit organizations such as the Free Clinic, Babycycle, the Area Agency on Aging of Pasco and Pinellas for Diapers for Dignity, and others.

## Saints Among Us



#### From China to Chinatown, a Missionary to Those of Asian Descent

Church work among Chinese Americans in the San Francisco Bay area dates back to the middle of the 19th Century, but truly began to flourish under the lead-

Ng Gee Ching, born in China in 1883, arrived as a child in Honolulu, Hawaii. Initially lukewarm toward Christianity, he agreed to assist Deaconess Emma Drant, who taught him English in exchange for his teaching her Cantonese and assisting the Chinese community in Hawaii.

ership of Daniel Gee Ching Wu.

Inspired by Deaconess Drant's faith, he converted to Christianity, was baptized, and, as was the custom of the day, took "Daniel" as a colloquial name. He changed his surname to "Wu," which is the Mandarin pronunciation of his name, and

which Americans not of Chinese descent could pronounce more easily.

After the 1906 San Francisco earthquake, Wu moved from Hawaii to San Francisco, responding to a call for help from the mainland community. Chinese immigrants were

> especially hard hit, and many moved from Chinatown across the bay to Oakland, where Deaconess Drant and Wu established a church that became known as the Church of Our Saviour. (Deaconess Drant had previously established True Sunshine Episcopal Mission in San Francisco.)

While helping to manage both missions, Wu studied for the priesthood at the Church Divinity School of the Pacific. Upon

his ordination in 1912, Wu became vicar of both missions, which thrived despite the racial discrimination and other hardships still faced by congregation members. Daniel Wu devoted his ministry to work among Chinese immigrants. He frequently worked the docks and ports of entry, made contact with those newly arrived, and worked in whatever way possible to ease transition to their new home. To keep them connected to their heritage, Wu and the people of his congregations offered classes in Chinese to children and instruction in English to adults. About 250 children and adults attended these daily classes.

For 36 years Daniel Gee Ching Wu and his congregations opened their hearts and their churches to generations of Chinese Americans and played a singularly important role in establishing the ministry of The Episcopal Church among those of Asian descent.

Daniel G.C. Wu's feast day is celebrated April 6.

#### Feedback from the participants:

- It deepened my knowledge of the trauma inflicted on the Native American communities and increased my compassion for dysfunction often seen in those communities. I am coming to understand and be amazed by the resilience of so many groups that we white Euroamericans have traumatized over the centuries.
  - From this exhibit I learned

- about the lasting hurt of people who are stripped of their culture as children, and the work that many of them do to re-establish their culture. How arrogant white people were (and still are) to believe that we are a superior race.
- The injustices have been wider spread and longer lasting than I was aware of. Confirms my resolve to keep learning and making others aware of the issues.
