We'll Say Goodbye to Dean Morris on June 25, After 15 Years and Many Accomplishments

Dean Morris has announced that he will retire as dean and rector of the Cathedral at the end of June. His departure marks the end of 15 years as our spiritual leader, the longest-tenured dean in the Cathedral's history, and nearly 30 years of parish ministry.

"The past few years have been the most difficult of my life," he said in a letter to the congregation May 25. He cited the deaths of his parents, his wife Christina's battle with cancer, and the death by suicide last summer of his son Henry — a series of events that "have left me broken-hearted in a way I never thought imaginable."

He has waited nearly a year since Henry's death to discern the best course for his future. "I know now that the time is right and I have peace with that decision," he said in the letter.

In a statement to the congregation, Senior Warden Lucas Fleming praised Dean Morris's many accomplishments: growing our membership, eliminating huge debt

from the construction of our campus and building an endowment that has reached \$4-million; making the Cathedral a place of inclusion, welcome, and diversity; our strong music and arts programs; formation for all ages, including offerings for children and youth that attract families who want to bring their children up in a diverse environment; and worship services that are spiritually enriching.

The dean's last Sunday with us will be June 25. We will honor him and Christina with a festive coffee hour after both the 8 and 10:15 a.m. services. talked to Music Director Dwight Thomas, and we can expect to hear his favorite hymns and anthems!

The Morrises will continue to live in St. Petersburg. As is the standard practice in The Episcopal Church, once he leaves, the dean will not return to perform baptisms, weddings, or funerals, and the Morrises will worship elsewhere.

The Chapter has met with Bishop Douglas Scharf to plan next steps. During the summer our worship will be led by familiar faces: the Rev. Canon Brandon Peete, the Rev. Canon Dr. Thomas Williams, and the Rev. Canon Richard H. Norman, and by our new curate, the Rev. Michael Alford, who joins us June 12. <u>Story, page 4.</u>

The bishop's hope is that an interim dean can be with us by October. At some point this fall a search committee will be formed. The search process typically takes six to nine months. The bishop and the senior warden will work with the Chapter to guide the. congregation through this time

of transition.

Our lay staff will remain in place, continuing to oversee the day-to-day operation of the Cathedral. Events will continue as scheduled: Spiritual Pride, Vacation Bible School, Oktoberfest, meetings of guilds and committees, activities for children and youth.

"It's important to me to be with my chil-

dren more," the dean said of his decision to retire now. So is his desire not to simply "phone it in" for another few years before retiring. "That's unfair to God and the spirit of Jesus, and it's unfair to this community and this congregation."

"I have many fond memories of the churches I have served," the dean said in his letter to the congregation. "I love my church back home in Louisiana where I was raised. But this church, our cathedral, is my favorite church in the world. I cherish our diversity and inclusivity. I am deeply moved by our liturgy and music. Nobody does that part better than we do! And our formation and fellowship are fun and life-giving.

"Thank you very much for allowing me to be your priest. It has meant the world to me."

Pilgrimage Will Visit Training Site Of the Legendary Tuskegee Airmen

The Cathedral's Becoming Beloved Community committee invites you to participate in a four-day pilgrimage, April 11-14, 2024, to significant racial and social-justice sites in Montgomery, Selma, and Tuskegee, AL.

Among our stops is the Tuskegee Airmen National Historic Site.

In the early 1940s, key leaders within the United States Army Air Corps (Army Air Forces) refused to acknowledge that Afri-

can-Americans had the physical or intellectual capacity to become successful military pilots. But pressure from civil-rights groups and African-American leaders persuaded the Army to train a small number of Afri-



can-American pilot cadets under special conditions.

They chose Tuskegee Institute (now Tuskegee University) in Alabama, in the heart of the Jim Crow South, to operate a primary flight school. The Tuskegee Airmen were the first African-Americans to complete their training and enter the Army Air Corps. Almost 1,000 aviators and some 10,000 support personnel were produced at Tuskegee.

The Airmen were fighting for victory on two fronts: victory in war abroad, and victory against racism in America.

The Airmen were not just pilots. They were technicians, radio operators, medical

personnel, quartermasters, parachute riggers, mechanics, bombardiers, navigators, meteorologists, control tower operators, dispatchers, cooks, and others. Also included were Caucasian officers, Native Americans, Caribbean islanders, Latinos, and people of mixed racial heritage. And they were women, as well as men, who worked in those same capacities and more.

The outstanding performance of the Airmen in battle and the leadership of Alfred "Chief" Anderson, the "father of Black aviation"; Benjamin O. Davis Jr., who went on to became the first brigadier general in the U.S. Air Force; and Daniel "Chappie" James, the first four-star general, helped pave the way for desegregation of the military.

These accomplishments helped set the stage for civil-rights advocates to continue the struggle to end racial discrimination

during the civil-rights movement of the 1950s and 1960s. The story of the Tuskegee Airmen constitutes a powerful and seminal metaphor for the struggle of African American freedom in America.

American history.


"It was a tumultuous period that included the Bush v. Gore presidential election, 9/11, the housing bubble and Great Recession, and the election of Barack Obama.

"As Mormino shows, Florida is a place of deep conflicts — North and South, liberal and conservative, newcomer and local, growth and conservation — with histories that can be traced back centuries. In 2000–2010, Mormino argues, these tensions collided to produce a 'Big Bang' that will continue to resonate in years to come.

"Mormino assesses this crucible of change and explains the social, cultural, and political intricacies of a state the world struggles to understand. *Dreams in the New Century* unravels Florida's complicated recent history in a gripping, informative, and fascinating narrative."

FAST Continues Pressure for Affordable Housing in St. Petersburg

faith & action for strength together

About 100 members of FAST (Faith and Action for Strength Together), including parishioners from St. Peter's, gathered on

the steps of City Hall on May 18 to press their demands for more affordable housing in St. Petersburg.

FAST wants the city to create 5,000 housing units for families making 80 percent of the area median income or less, which is around

\$65,000 for a family of four, by the end of Mayor Ken Welch's first term in 2026.

In April, Welch pledged 3,200 units of affordable housing citywide over the next decade. The faith leaders said it wasn't clear what incomes families would need to qualify for that housing.

No one from the Welch administration

was present at the demonstration. In a statement, the mayor said his goals align with the group's mission. He said his new

plan increased the projected number of affordable and workforce units preserved, created or supported annually from 675 units to 780 units, an increase of 15.5 percent from the previous target.

The demonstration followed FAST's annual

gathering in April, at which they vowed to flood Mayor Welch's office with postcards telling personal stories about the inability to find affordable housing.

FAST is a justice-ministry organization of 50 religious congregations throughout Pinellas County. Each year they set priorities and press public officials to support initia-







Donation of Appreciated Assets Can Benefit You and the Cathedral

Part 3

We conclude our series of articles dealing with methods of giving to the Cathedral that may have tax advantages for you. This month we will provide information on the donation of appreciated assets, such as stocks and bonds. If you missed our prior articles on Donor Advised Funds or IRA RMDs, you can find those articles at speathedral.org/give.

Gifts of appreciated assets have long been an important way for donors to make tax-advantaged contributions to the Cathedral. To avoid capital gains taxes, gifts of appreciated assets must have been held by the donor for a least one year and must be given directly to the Cathedral.

For the purpose of a tax deduction, the donor receives credit for the value of the stock on the day the transfer is complete. Donations of appreciated stocks and bonds can be made by your financial institution directly to the Cathedral's Merrill Lynch account. For example, if you purchased 100 shares of a stock at \$25 per share 10 years ago, that stock may now be worth \$100 per share. If you were to sell 50 shares of that stock, you would realize \$5,000 and would have potential capital gains taxes on the \$3,750.00 profit. (Sale price of \$100 minus cost price of \$25 = \$75 profit per share

sold.) If you then donated that \$5,000 to the Cathedral as your Faith Filled Financial Commitment, you could take it as a deduction on your income tax if you itemize deductions.

However, if you donated those same 50 shares directly to St. Peter's, you would pay no capital gains tax on the profit and would still be able to

take the \$5,000 deduction on your income tax if you itemize.

You can also name the Cathedral as the designated beneficiary of one or more of your financial assets to be transferred to St. Peter's at the time of your death. The Cathedral can then liquidate those assets tax-free. When you inform the Cathedral of its designation, you become a member of our Legacy Society.

This method is used by a number of parishioners. It decreases their tax liability and increases the Cathedral's revenue. Another win/win situation!

It could be beneficial for you to check with your financial advisor about giving appreciated assets directly to the Cathedral. If you would like more information, please contact Ray McColgan (RMcColgan@me.com). If enough people are interested, an informational meeting can be planned.

A Challenge Grant and Community Partnerships Help Family Promise Help More Homeless Families

There is plenty of good news this month as Family Promise serves more clients, builds relationships with the community, finds new sources of funds and supplies, and creates new ways for supporters to assist homeless families in Pinellas County.

* Our biggest news is that we have been awarded a Challenge Grant from "Help

Us Move In," a national program that will match all donations, dollar for dollar, up to \$20,000. The money raised provides application fees, deposits, and utility assistance to our guest families as they move into permanent homes. It can also be used to assist those at imminent risk of homelessness by assisting with past-due rents and utility

What Is Family Promise?

Family Promise of Pinellas County is a bridge shelter and day-center program for unhoused children and their families. It offers a range of services — shelter, meals, case management, prevention assistance, transportation, and financial support — to those who are homeless or at imminent risk of becoming homeless. It provides temporary housing at congregational and community sites or at its own shelter. Families spend days at the Day Center at Central Christian Church, 6201 22nd Ave. N, where they seek jobs, social services, and permanent housing.

collect feminine hygiene products.

- * Our first "Gimme Promise" road race on April 22 attracted 82 runners. Thanks to the participants and to our volunteers for making it happen.
- * This month we'll introduce our new Progressive Split the Pot Raffle, which raises money for us and gives you the chance to be a monthly winner or to win the jackpot at our end-of-the-year celebration. Find details on our website, fppinellas.org, or on Twitter: @fppinellas.

In April we assisted 34 families. Five of those were living in our shelter and 28 atrisk families were assisted through our day program. The day center performed 1,258 services and our partner congregation provided 280 bed nights for our families. Our dedicated volunteers performed 804.5 hours of services and gave \$2,483.60 in inkind food donations for our families, which resulted in 810 meals for our families. We graduated one family in April and three more in May.
