Involvement at the Cathedral: I'm chair of the Becoming Beloved Community team, seeking racial healing and justice. I facilitate our Sacred Ground circle, an Episcopal Church-wide program to foster racial reconciliation. I am the host of our Civil Rights Pilgrimage to Alabama next April. I am a member of the planning group for the

Chapter Continues Preparation For New Roof, Bell Tower Repairs

At its October meeting, the Chapter moved ahead with plans for a new roof over the nave, restoration of the bell tower, and repair of the carillon bells.

Roof leaks have damaged the interior ceiling plaster, and the bell tower shows signs of significant stress cracks and potential structural issues that present safety hazards.

We are working with All Trades Historical Restoration of St. Petersburg and The Verdin Co., which specializes in bells and chimes, to develop a budget and a timetable. Our intention is to complete this work before the 2024 hurricane season.

We are preparing now to make a presentation to the diocese for its approval and support of this project. The carillon bells in the tower, which have been inoperative for several years from a lightning strike, will also be repaired and restored. A recent assessment by The Verdin Co. showed that support beams and bolts for the bells and chimes are rotted, rusted, and in need of replacement.

There is also a need to install a controller and interface board that will allow for the bells' operation. This work will begin when the scaffolding for the tower restoration is in place.

Font of Every Blessing

Our new baptismal font will be blessed at the 10:15 a.m. service on November 5.

The wood stands for the glass font and the candle reflect the Gothic arches throughout the Cathedral, and the rich materials of the baptistery — marble, brass, wood — reflect the impor-



tance of baptism. The stands are made of sapele, an African hardwood that has similar characteristics to South American Mahogany.

The font was crafted by the Morean Glass Studio and the stands by Anderson Lumber. The platform for the baptistery was built by Peter Ortruba and his assistants. The entire project was designed by architect Bill Harvard Jr., lifelong member of the Cathedral, and was made possible by the gift of a generous anonymous donor.

Contemporary Composer's Service Is Focus of November Choral Evensong

The service of Choral Evensong, at 5 p.m., Sunday, November 26 — Christ the King Sunday — includes the "St. Thomas Service" by Trevor Weston (b. 1967).

Weston is the son of immigrants from Barbados whose works often touch on themes of slavery and the history of African-Americans in the United States. His commissioned oratorio, *American Lamentations*, premiered in May at St. Thomas Fifth Avenue in New York City, dealing with the Episcopal Church's delicate relationship with enslavement and racial inequality. (As a boy Weston was a choral scholar at the St. Thomas Choir School.) Another piece, a requiem, celebrated en-

slaved workers on the rice plantations of South Carolina.

He is the winner of the first Emerging Black Composers Project, sponsored by the San Francisco Conservatory of Music and the San Francisco Symphony. His orchestral work *Push* was inspired by a comment by Antonin Dvorak — about Ameri-

> cans' limitless enthusiasm for all things new, the "American push" — and premiered at the San Francisco Symphony in September 2022.

Weston has a doctorate in music from the University of California, Berkeley. He is head of the music department at Drew University in New Jersey and teaches at the Juilliard School.

An organ prelude, at 4:45 p.m., offers Max Reger's *Choralfantasie über 'Ein feste Burg ist unser Gott,'* Op. 27, in celebration of the composer's 150th birthday.

The Cathedral Chamber Choir sings, and Music Director Dwight Thomas is director and organist. A freewill offering is taken, and a light reception follows.

Baroque Instruments and Voices Will Start the Holiday Season

Start the Christmas season at 7 p.m. December 2 when the Master Chorale's new chamber ensemble, MC Voices, joins with St. Pete Baroque in a concert called "Candlelight Baroque," when



they will sing and play music of the season on period instruments at the Cathedral.

This is a first-time outing for MC Voices, and its first time rendering early music with authentic instruments. St. Pete Baroque won an enthusiastic following at its January concert at the Cathedral. They perform the music of the period (1600-1750) on instruments including harpsichord, lute, viola da gamba, viola d'amore, and baroque winds.

Bach's *Nun komm der heiden Heiland*

(BWV 61); Praetorius's *Lo how a rose*; *Coventry Carol*, arranged by Burke; *Infant holy, infant lowly*; Vivaldi's *Magnificat*, and Gruber's *Silent Night*.


Who's the Real Messiah? A Biblical Battle May Decide

Going Deeper: Exploring the Sites of Our Civil Right Pilgrimage

There's still time to register for our fourday pilgrimage in April 2024 to significant racial and social-justice sites in Montgomery, Selma, and Tuskegee, AL. The Cathe-

dral's Becoming Beloved Community invites those wellversed in justice issues and those just beginning the journey.

A series of events took place in Alabama and throughout the South in the 1950s and '60s that culminated in the passage of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Voting Rights Act of 1965 — from the day in 1955 when

Rosa Parks refused to give up her seat on a bus in Montgomery to the 1965 Selma-to-Montgomery March.

On this pilgrimage you'll learn how each event moved the arc of the universe a little closer to justice.

As we learn the stories of the Civil Rights struggles in the South, we can sometimes best understand them through exploring the personal stories both of those who lived and breathed them, and of the families affected by them for generations to come.

FAST Sets Its Priorities to Improve Pinellas County

Twenty-one enthusiastic, justice-seeking network members from the Cathedral joined with nearly 400 others October 16

at the FAST Annual Assembly. We voted to continue work on criminal justice reform, water quality, and affordable housing.

Hillary Peete was announced as Corresponding Secretary of the Executive Committee and the Rev. Mike Alford gave

the closing prayer. All are welcome to join us in this important work in our community: identifying areas of concern, developing strategies, and meeting with elected leaders to seek their support.

Our criminal-justice efforts focus on creating a diversion program for those who are arrested for nonviolent driving offenses, such as an expired tag or suspended

license. Some people drive with suspended licenses because they have no alternative way to get to work. The fines and fees as-

sociated with these arrests can be staggering for those who are already struggling financially. The result is the criminalization of poverty. FAST continues to meet with St. Petersburg Chief of Police Anthony Holloway to ask him to create a diversion program, as has been done in Bro-

ward, Manatee, and Sarasota counties.

In the coming months, we'll share updates on affordable housing and water quality.
